March is Women's History Month, and it should be a month to celebrate. Women have been a part of America's history and are important to our past, present, and future. Without the women and girls of the past, our nation would not be fair or just, and without the women and girls of the future, our nation would not develop and succeed.

Voting Rights: In America's past, women were not permitted to vote, and they didn't have a say in government. After decades of protesting, petitioning, and organizing, Congress ratified the 19th Amendment, which gave women voting rights. Although American women could vote, minority women faced discrimination and prejudice until the 20th century.

Careers: After the 19th Amendment was ratified, some women were allowed to work, but many had to stay at home. Some of the jobs that women performed during that time were unsafe and filthy. There were very few educated women in that time period. Women faced many barriers and prejudice, but after many years, more careers and jobs opened up for women. Even so, women still faced adversities and hardships in their workspaces.







Sports: In Ancient Greece, women could participate in some sports such as foot racing, but they could not participate in other Olympic events. Spartan women, women in certain tribes in Africa, and Native American women were believed to play sports as well. During the Victorian Age, many people limited sports to women, but in the late 1800s and early 1900s, athletic clubs were created, and at the 1900 Olympics, 22 female athletes competed with men in sports including: sailing, croquet, and equestrian sports. Women were also allowed to participate in tennis and lawn golf. The first Women's Olympic Games occurred in Paris, 1922. In 1920, some U.S. universities had women's athletic programs. During the 1940s, the first women's sports league (All American Girls Professional Baseball League) was born. In 1972, the Title IX of the Education Act permitted women equal opportunity in sports and education. Despite this, women still faced barriers such as not getting a proper wage and facing inequality.

Literature: In the past, women were not thought to be writers and journalists, but important female writers broke these boundaries. In 1868, Louisa May Alcott wrote Little Women, a famous novel that is now a movie today. To gain better opportunities, some women had a male pen name. Emily Brontë wrote Wuthering Heights under the pen name Ellis Bell. Some people believed that women shouldn't be able to write science fiction and horror stories, but women broke these barriers as well. In 1817, Mary Shelley wrote the science fiction novel, Frankenstein. In the early 19th century, women continued to write and revolutionize despite struggles and unfairness. In addition, many popular books such as The Hunger Games, Twilight, and the Harry Potter series were written by women.

Music/Arts: Women are an important part of America's history of music and art. Some female musicians that you may know include: Olivia Rodrigo, Taylor Swift, and Billie Eilish. There are also many women artists such as Frida Kahlo.

To celebrate Women's History Month, you could say thank you or show appreciation towards any woman or girl in your life. You could also research about a famous woman you would like to learn more about.

CHEESECAKE!

INGREDIENTS

- 1 1/2 CUPS (150G)
 GRAHAM CRACKER
 CRUMBS (ABOUT
 10 WHOLE GRAHAM
 CRACKERS.
 CRUSHED)
- 1/4 CUP (28G)
 CONFECTIONERS'
 SUGAR
- 6 TABLESPOONS (85G) BUTTER. MELTED
- 1/8 TEASPOON TABLE SALT FILLING
- TWO 8-DUNCE PACKAGES (452G) CREAM CHEESE. AT ROOM TEMPERATURE
- 2/3 CUP (133G)
 GRANULATED
 SUGAR
- 2 LARGE EGGS. AT
 ROOM
 TEMPERATURE
- 1 TEASPOON KING ARTHUR PURE VANILLA EXTRACT



- 1. SET THE PIE PAN ONTO A BAKING SHEET. IF DESIRED: THIS MAKES IT EASIER TO TRANSPORT IN AND OUT OF THE OVEN. AND ALSO PROTECTS THE BOTTOM OF THE CRUST FROM ANY POTENTIAL SCORCHING. POUR THE FILLING INTO THE CRUST.
- 2. TO BAKE THE CHEESECAKE: PLACE THE CHEESECAKE IN THE OVEN. BAKE IT FOR 20 MINUTES. THEN ADD A CRUST SHIELD: OR SHIELD THE CRUST WITH STRIPS OF ALUMINUM FOIL. BAKE FOR AN ADDITIONAL 10 MINUTES (FOR A TOTAL OF ABOUT 30 MINUTES). A DIGITAL THERMOMETER INSERTED INTO THE FILLING 1" FROM THE EDGE SHOULD READ BETWEEN 165°F AND 170°F: THE FILLING WON'T LOOK ENTIRELY SET IN THE CENTER.
- 3. REMOVE THE CHEESECAKE FROM THE OVEN AND SET IT ON A RACK TO COOL. ONCE THE CAKE IS COOL. REFRIGERATE IT. COVERED. UNTIL YOU'RE READY TO SERVE IT.
- 4. SERVE CHEESECAKE IN WEDGES. WITH FRESH FRUIT IF DESIRED.
- 5. STORAGE INFORMATION: STORE ANY LEFTOVER CHEESECAKE IN THE REFRIGERATOR FOR SEVERAL DAYS: FREEZE FOR LONGER STORAGE.



"Incoming 6th grade advice is to stay organized, make friends, get involved, try your best, be kind, and have fun."




